BIASED BASED POLICING

The Wilmington Police Department is dedicated to addressing and removing biases from the act of law enforcement.

There were SIX complaints alleging biased-based policing out of 38 citizen complaints filed in 2020. That's a decrease of thirteen complaints from 2019.

Three of these allegations were traffic stops, while the others were investigative, routine patrol, and suspicious vehicle. All six were exonerated or unfounded.

USE OF FORCEDEMOGRAPHICS

These numbers are also reflective of the overall demographics of the Wilmington police force.

Early Warning System

The Wilmington Police Department Professional Standards Division utilizes a multi-faceted Personal Early Warning System (IAPRo) to track use-of-force incidents, pursuit involvement, citizen complaints, internal investigations, officer-involved crashes, officer-involved injuries/fatalities, and departmental property losses. When an officer meets or exceeds the threshold for these incidents (set by the dept.), an alert is sent out to the first line supervisor and affected employee.

In 2020, Professional Standards sent out 137 alerts and all 137 were received.

VEHICLE PURUITS

Wilmington police pursued 35 vehicles in 2020. The majority of pursuits, 29, covered two miles or less and the most common time for pursuits was between 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. and from 8p.m. to 10 p.m.
